I am grateful to our broader community, who showed up in countless ways over the year to support our learners.

Our seniors will graduate together after a hard year, and I cannot wait to see what they will accomplish in the years ahead. The talented staff in the district will help us continue to grow, evolve, and deliver the quality education our students deserve and our community expects.

As we look to the fall, we all hope for a return to normalcy. It is also clear that even as we have successfully navigated teaching and learning in a pandemic, there are still challenges ahead. Board reviews need for 2021 Operating Referendum


While no final decisions have been made, the Eastern Carver County School Board has been gathering information and reviewing options for a potential 2021 Operating Referendum.

The failure of the November 2019 Operating Referendum, along with inconsistent state and federal funding, continue to impact the district's budget. In addition to the \$6 million cuts to the budget for the 2020-21 school year, the Board approved an additional \$3.1 million in cuts and revenue enhancements for the 2021-22 school year. Without additional future funding, the district has proposed cuts totaling \$5.7 million dollars for the 2022-23 and 2023-2024 school years.


The Board's timeline for this important decision has included review of detailed Facility Task Force recommendations, enrollment data, community survey results, as well as budget and financial forecasts for the next three years. The Board is expected to make a referendum decision at its June 28th meeting.

CONGRATS TO THE CLASS OF 2021!

More than 750 Chanhassen and Chaska High School graduates received their diplomas at the June 11th ceremonies this year. Graduates are heading coast-to-coast to continue their post-secondary education and plans. Four graduates from the Integrated Arts Academy will attend the prestigious Minneapolis College of Art and Design (MCAD) in the fall of 2021. Integrated Arts Academy (IAA) is one of the district’s three high schools. MCAD is a strong national leader in fine arts, design, and entrepreneurship education. The IAA curriculum uses a project-based learning model integrating visual arts, horticulture, and culinary arts into the core curriculum for a high school diploma. (IAA graduates: Brock Thalhuber, Sam Nuteson, Ethereal Davis, and Julia Meles.)



One-time federal funding used for costs associated with pandemic

Eastern Carver County Schools received one-time federal funding to be exclusively used to cover costs caused by the hardships associated with the COVID-19 pandemic. Congress has passed three stimulus bills, the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act, the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act (CRRSA), and the American Rescue Plan Act (ARP), that provided nearly \$190.5 billion nationally to the Elementary and Secondary Emergency Education Relief (ESSER) Fund.

ECCS currently has been allocated over \$5.7 million in COVID relief funding. The district is allowed to spend the special funding on a range of things including:

- Upgrades to enhance indoor air quality, and ventilation in buildings
- PPE for staff (masks, face shields, etc.)
- Plexiglass dividers in school spaces such as office reception areas
- Technology and internet hotspots for distance learning
- Additional cleaning and sanitation products required during COVID-19
- Mental health support
- Summer school programming
- Some staff salaries as they related to teaching during COVID-19 such as additional substitute teachers
- Meeting the needs of underserved students

ECCS allocates these funds responsibly with the health and safety of our students and staff in mind, and with the priority to preserve in-person learning. These funds cannot be used to address the issue of enrollment loss due to COVID-19.

District welcomes new leaders

Eastern Carver County School District is pleased to announce a new slate of leaders in the district. **Shaun Walsh** has been named the new Director of Community Education, **Beth Holm** as the new Principal of Bluff Creek Elementary, **Ryan Finke** as the new Principal of Carver Elementary, **Peter Morse** as the new Principal of Jonathan Elementary, and **Dr. Greg Martin** as the new Principal of Chaska Middle School East. All five were selected after thorough interview processes involving multiple rounds of interviews with various stakeholders. They will begin their positions this summer. They are assuming their new roles after the retirements of Jackie Johnston, Joan MacDonald, June Johnson, and Nancy Wittman-Beltz. Martin replaces Beth Holm at Chaska Middle School East.

an additional \$5.7 million dollars in cuts are proposed for the 2022-2023 and 2023-2024 school years.

The School Board is also determining whether to pursue an operating referendum this fall. Over the past several months they have thoughtfully reviewed the work of the Facilities Task Force, reviewed the district budget and finances, and on June 28th they will make their decision. Look for more information in the days and weeks ahead about the results of that decision and what that means for the fall.

As I look back on this year, I am so proud of the work we have done together as a district community. We have outstanding students, an amazing staff, and a caring and supportive community.
